Executive Summary

MAPS 3 is a \$777 million capital improvements program in Oklahoma City that used a one-cent, limited-term sales tax to pay for debt-free projects that would improve quality of life for residents, leverage private economic development through public investment, and create new jobs.

The eight MAPS 3 projects included a Downtown Convention Center, a Modern Streetcar, a Downtown Public Park, Oklahoma River Improvements, Oklahoma State Fairgrounds Improvements, four Senior Health and Wellness Centers, Trails and Sidewalks. This package was designed to continue the momentum Oklahoma City had gained since the first MAPS was implemented.

The City Council oversaw MAPS 3 with recommendations from an 11-member Citizens Advisory Board and seven subcommittees. The Oklahoma City MAPS office implemented the projects under the leadership of Program Director Eric Wenger (2009-2011) and David Todd (2011-2024). ADG Blatt was the consultant supporting the overall program.

The program collected a total of \$801 million from April 2010 to December 2017. All projects were completed within the program budget by 2024.

Financial Overview

On December 8, 2009, voters passed MAPS 3, approving a one-cent sales tax for seven years and nine months, from April 2010 through December 2017. The tax was projected to generate approximately \$777 million. At the conclusion of the sales-tax period, the City collected \$803.3 million, earned \$35.4 million in interest revenues and approximately \$383,000 in other revenues.

In total, City Council approved 32 items for additional funding from excess collections and interest.

Like the previous MAPS programs, the projects were completed debt free on a "pay-as-you-go" basis.

Downtown Convention Center

The state-of-the-art facility elevates the Oklahoma City's capacity for hosting meetings and conventions. The Oklahoma City Convention Center captures the spirit and beauty of Oklahoma City. The interior design and art reflect Oklahoma City's culture and history while the soaring glass walls and spacious balconies show off our remarkable sunsets and sweeping views of Scissortail Park. The building's sleek and modern design features materials intended for energy efficiency and resiliency against the weather. The massive 500,000-square-foot interior includes a 200,730-square-foot exhibit hall on the first floor, which is divisible into four halls. About 45,000 square feet of meeting spaces are on all levels of the building, and many have operable walls to make the spaces flexible. The rooms can be configured to provide up to 27 meeting spaces. A 9,700-square-foot junior ballroom is located on the third floor and boasts sweeping views of Scissortail Park. The building's fourth floor features a 30,000-square-foot ballroom along with pre-function space and a large balcony overlooking Scissortail Park.

Oklahoma River Improvements

This project included the RIVERSPORT Rapids whitewater rafting and kayaking center on the Oklahoma River and improvements to existing rowing facilities to make Oklahoma City a can't-miss destination for water sports enthusiasts. The whitewater park is suitable for beginners enjoying a summer weekend and elite kayaking competitions. Adjacent to the water park is the only competition rowing venue with permanent lighting in the country.

RIVERSPORT Rapids is one of only three man-made whitewater venues in the nation. Six pumps recirculate treated water through two channels to create class II-IV rapids. Flow can be adjusted to offer various levels of rafting and kayaking experiences.

Senior Health and Wellness Centers

The MAPS 3 Senior Health and Wellness Centers connect Oklahoma City's seniors with important services, and also with each other. The centers, which are located in different parts of the City, have operating partners experienced in providing services seniors need, and they provide social and recreational settings for a wide range of uses.



Sidewalks


The MAPS 3 Sidewalks project was designed to promote a more pedestrian-friendly lifestyle in Oklahoma City. More than 55 miles of new sidewalks were constructed in areas throughout the city with a high demand for pedestrian amenities.


Trails

The \$39.5-million MAPS 3 Trails project promotes a more active lifestyle by taking advantage of Oklahoma City's natural beauty. The trails wind through wetlands, wooded areas, and natural landscapes, as well as neighborhoods and more urban settings. The trails are part of the City of OKC's Trails Master Plan.

Will Rogers Trail

The 8.1-mile Will Rogers Trail's north trailhead includes a parking lot at Meridian and NW Expressway just south of Lake Hefner. Heading southeast, the protected trail generally follows the NW Expressway to the Lake Hefner Parkway. A crosswalk gets pedestrians and cyclists across NW Expressway safely. The trail follows Interstate 44 south as it wraps around the north side of State Fair Park, then turns south following May Avenue to the south trailhead on the Oklahoma River Trail system.

West River Trail

The scenic 7.5-mile trail begins at the southeast corner of Lake Overholser and connects to the Oklahoma River trail.

Lake Draper Trail

The 13.5-mile Lake Draper Trail loops the lake from which it gets its name in southeast Oklahoma City. The wide, asphalt trail with a concrete curb line is for walkers, runners and cyclists. Because of the hills along the side of the lake, it has more elevation changes than other trails in Oklahoma City.

Oklahoma State Fairgrounds Improvements

The Bennett Event Center is the cornerstone of the MAPS 3 Oklahoma State Fairgrounds Improvements project. The fairgrounds, a year-round economic engine for Oklahoma City for its horse shows and other events, will benefit from the state-of-the-art expo center for indoor events, plus improvements to parking and other infrastructure.

Downtown Public Park

Scissortail Park is a 70-acre urban oasis extending from the core of downtown Oklahoma City to the shore of the Oklahoma River. The 40-acre Upper Park and 30-acre Lower Park are now open, and the Skydance Bridge connects the two sections. The Upper Park includes amenities and spaces for programmed events, while the Lower Park was designed to be more reflective of the natural environment around Oklahoma City. Altogether, Scissortail Park offers educational and recreational activities for Oklahoma City residents and visitors.

Modern Streetcar/Transit

The OKC Streetcar connects downtown Oklahoma City to Bricktown, Midtown and Automobile Alley, passing key landmarks like MAPS 3's Scissortail Park, the MAPS 3 Convention Center and Paycom Center. The project included acquiring seven streetcars and constructed a 20,000-square-foot storage and maintenance facility at 406 SW 7th St.

Santa Fe Station
