FLOCK CAMERAS & DATA

WHAT IT IS

- ✓ Captures a point-in-time image on a public road
- ✓ Reads plate numbers, letters, and state
- ✓ Identifies vehicle make, color, and body-style
- ✓ Alerts to vehicles entered into NCIC
- ✓ Generates leads for criminal investigations

WHAT IT ISN'T

- ✗ Does not record video or audio
- ✗ Does not track vehicles continuously
- ✗ Does not capture driver or occupants
- ✗ Does not track speed or issue citations
- ✗ Does not collect personal or biometric info

Searches are continuously audited.

Controlled access, built-in accountability

- ✓ Only authorized users can log in
- ✓ Sharing requires OKCPD approval
- ✓ Images & data transitioning to 7-day, automatic deletion

By policy, data sharing is controlled.



UPDATES TO AGREEMENT

Amendment modifies the Master Services Agreement between Flock Group Inc. and the City of Oklahoma City.

- Adds Section 4.4, restricting sharing of Agency data with federal agencies.
- Prohibits federal access through databases, integrations, hotlists, portals, contractors, or investigative features.
- Defines 'legally required' disclosures as only those compelled by court-issued processes.
- Requires Flock to notify and cooperate with the Agency if federal entities issue compulsory legal demands.
- Amendment supersedes conflicting terms in the original Agreement.



GUARDRAILS

PROPOSED OPTIONS FOR CONSIDERATION	CURRENT OKCPD PROTOCOL
1. PERMITTED USE <i>Define What ALPRs Can and Can't be Used For</i>	• Used exclusively for official law enforcement purposes • Purpose is documented with each search • All searches are subject to internal audit • Inappropriate use is considered misconduct
2. DATA SHARING <i>Restrict to Approved Partners</i>	• Data is only shared with other law enforcement agencies with approval • OKCPD does not currently participate in the automatic national sharing partnership
3. DATA RETENTION <i>Reduce Default from 30 Days to 7 Days</i>	• OKCPD has opted-in to transition to a 7-day retention policy
4. EXPANSION CONTROLS <i>Council Approval Required Before Adding Cameras</i>	• Annual contract renewal and any expansion of cameras greater than \$50,000 requires City Council approval
5. SUNSET AND REAUTHORIZATION <i>ALPR Program sunsets in 3 – 5 years unless reauthorized by Council</i>	• Vendor contract is reviewed and renewed by City Council annually



FEDERAL COURT RULINGS

The Department has worked closely with the Municipal Counselor's Office to ensure that its usage of ALPR does not violate the 4th Amendment.

The Municipal Counselor's Office has reviewed two recent federal cases in which the courts analyzed two separate challenges to the usage of Flock ALPR by two separate police departments in Oklahoma:

United States v. Acosta (Northern District of Oklahoma)

United States v. Brown (Western District of Oklahoma)

Both cases found that a person has no reasonable expectation of privacy in:

- A license plate on a vehicle on a public street
- A vehicle's movements on public streets
- The exterior characteristics of a vehicle traveling on a public street

The Brown case specifically held that city's usage of Flock ALPR does "not provide an intimate window into a person's life."

Both Courts held that the usage of Flock ALPR did not violate the 4th Amendment.

Oklahoma City does not currently participate in Flock's automatic national sharing partnership. Information is shared exclusively with authorized agencies on an individual basis.
